### **Trends**


- Population growing at a slowing rate births down, deaths up
- Migration and mobility slowing
  - Harder to attract and retaining the best and brightest.
  - Labor tight very competitive in US
- Concentrated growth and larger counties getting larger
- Aging impacts everything... including the economy, labor force, housing, and public finance.
  - Largest share of future growth is the 65+
- Increase racial and ethnic diversity.

### 2020 Census Count

- US 331.5 million, + 22.7 million, 7.4% since 2010
  - second slowest growth rate on record
- **CO 5,774,000**, + 744,500, 14.8% since 2010
  - 6<sup>th</sup> ranked percent change, 9<sup>th</sup> in numeric change
  - Colorado gained an 8<sup>th</sup> seat
- 2020-2021 -Slowest US growth rate on record of .1%
  - 17 states lost population
  - Colorado + 27,700. 0.5% growth rate
  - Net Migration 14,700
  - Ranked 17<sup>th</sup> in percent growth and 11<sup>th</sup> in total growth








#### **Components of Population Change 1970-2021**








#### Births in Colorado and the US




Births, Deaths, and Net Migration 1985 to 2020





Net Migration by Age, 2000 to 2010












### Colorado Annual Housing Units and Household Growth







## U.S. Census Bureau Building Permits Survey New Privately Owned Housing Unit Authorizations







#### Implications From Age and Aging

- Slowing young adult growth next decade across US
- Consumer demand job creation, occupations, wages
- Labor force older, retirements, COVID, caregivers, look to increase labor participation in all age groups and backgrounds/skillsets.
- Housing household size, mobility, owners, accessibility
- Retires aging in place and demand from new workers.
- Millennials aging into prime home buyers and 2<sup>nd</sup> home ownership
- Gen Z aging into apartments and first time home buying
- Services for Older Adults if they cant age in place, leave.





#### Forecast Considerations

- Population growth is slowing slowing births
- Aging leaving labor force create more demand for workers
- Migration was slowing pre-pandemic competition
- International migration down 70%, domestic down 35%
- Growing race and ethnic diversity
- Resident housing supply -
- Ability to attract workers
- Plus increased demand for investments and second homes due to aging of Millennials (others as well)


#### Forecast Considerations

- Will all low wage jobs be recovered?
- "Part-Time" residents feel their presence but not included in population counts.
- Digital nomads
- Like a tourist but don't spend as much
- Teleworkers live in NWCCOG but job outside. Not driven by local job forecast but create demand
- How to increase labor force participation at all ages be creative.
- Employee centered vs. firm centered





#### Colorado population forecast methodology




Differences resolved by net migration


#### Percentage of Workers who Teleworked Due to COVID-19 in U.S.

(CPS Special Question - does not include those who already teleworked prior to pandemic)






#### Growth in Hispanic Population 2010-20
